Prehistoric Saber-Tooth Cub Is First To Be Found Mummified In Ice - And It Still Has Hair

Despite hundreds of scientific illustrations, no one knew for sure what a sabor-tooth cat actually looked like, until now.

As is sometimes the case, Siberian prospectors looking for mammoth tusks, likely illicitly, have uncovered another incredible Pleistocene mammal frozen in permafrost - in this instance, a 'saber-tooth kitten.'

Belonging to the species Homotherium latidens, palaeontologists at the Russian Academy of Sciences published a paper describing it, in which they introduce the world to the first real image of a saber-tooth cat, and they've picked out a variety of interesting details.

For decades, images produced according to fossilized bones have assumed that the long saber-like teeth grew down out of the animal's mouth, but this Homotherium's lips are twice as deep as other species of saber-tooth cats like Smilodon. This suggests the teeth may have been completely concealed. Other details, like muscular proportions and small foot pads, as well as the 'completely unexpected' color of the beast's fur, have presented the full picture of an animal that evolved in an environment and for hunting methods that have no modern parallel, scientists say. 'The cub had the enlarged neck muscles thought to occur in adults, and also had long, muscular forelimbs seen in adult Homotherium,' says Margaret Lewis, a paleontologist at Stockton University in New Jersey who was speaking with Nat Geo. The cub's jaw was already capable of wide gapes needed to fit those gnashers around their prey - 15% larger than a lion cub of the same age. The limbs too, were larger. In general, Homotherium was short-bodied with long limbs and the mummified cub's were around 23% longer than a lion cub. 'The uniform dark brown color of the mummy fur turned out to be completely unexpected,' Alexy Lopatin, the lead author on the paper from the Russian Academy told Nat Geo.

During the last Ice Age, huge herbivores trampled and grazed on plants, particularly shrubs and trees, meaning that much like today's savannahs, it would make the most sense for a predator that hunted juvenile and elderly members of these species - including mammoths - to blend into the grasses. 'It's fascinating that there doesn't seem to be any spotting or striping on the cubs,' Reynolds says, as such patterns are common among modern cats, including those who prowl among grasses.

A mystery surrounds the lack of a carpal pad - the one that sits higher up the foot of modern Pantherids, but for now, the study authors were not able to identify a reason for this.

Homotherium ranged widely all throughout the Northern Hemisphere, and previous remains have been found in North America. Many of the enigmas presented by the cub may be solved if an adult were found, which seems a greater possibility than anyone might have imagined before. www.goodnewsnetwork.org, A. Van Cats Lounge In 'Cat Villa' To Beat Summer Heat In Türkiye

At Van Yüzüncü Yıl University's Van Cat Research and Application Center in eastern Türkiye, the city's prized Van cats are receiving meticulous care and feeding. Known for their emotional nature, friendliness, silky white fur, lion-like gait, bushy tails, heterochromatic eyes and fondness for water, Van cats are among the city's most treasured symbols. The center works to preserve the breed and increase its numbers.

Housed in the 'Cat Villa' on the university grounds, the carefully protected cats draw thousands of local and foreign tourists each year. Staff regularly clean their food bowls and beds, trim their nails and take measures to shield them from the summer heat. In hot weather, the cats cool off in airconditioned rooms and occasionally swim in specially designed pools.



Center Director Abdullah Kaya told Anadolu Agency (AA) that August 8 is celebrated worldwide as International Cat Day, aimed at raising awareness of the challenges cats face. 'There are more than 500 million cats in the world and the difficult conditions they endure rarely come up,' Kaya said. 'Shelter conditions should be arranged with the animals' needs in mind. I hope August 8 becomes a day when issues about cats are discussed and awareness increases.' Kaya said Van cats are well cared for at the center.

'Life is really tough in this heat,' he said. 'We have pools where the animals can cool off whenever they want. They lack nothing in terms of comfort. Hopefully, all cats around the world will enjoy the same level of comfort as Van cats.' He contrasted their conditions with those of street cats, which often face hunger, thirst and abuse. 'Street cats are different,' he said. 'Their care, conditions and living situations are really much harder. That's why we hope August 8 will be a day when cat issues come to the forefront and are discussed.'

Gülşen Anadol, a tourist from Istanbul, said she visited the center with her family during a trip through southeastern Türkiye. 'This place is very beautiful. Moment Owner Realizes Cat Has Been Spending 'A Bit Too Much Time With Dog'

A Nebraska farmer has told Newsweek of an unlikely friendship after sharing footage online of the moment she realized the farm cat was spending 'a bit too much time' with the Labrador retriever.

The term 'copycat' couldn't have less to do with our feline friends. Its origins date back to 19th-century Maine as a term given to someone initiating or copying the work or actions of others. However, felines are more than capable of being copycats themselves.



In 2021, a study published in the journal Animal Cognition detailed an experiment in which a feline was trained to reproduce a small set of human-demonstrated actions on the command 'do it.' The cat involved in the experiment learned these actions by watching their human companion do them and replicating that. Over 16 trials, the feline was able to copy her owner successfully over 80 percent of the time. Their ability to do so spoke to not only their intelligence as a species but also the bond they enjoyed with their human companion.

A similar story appears to be playing out at Griebel Farms, a fifth-generation family farm located in Nebraska, where Charlie the orange cat has become a social-media sensation. But Charlie's online fame isn't down to any of his feline behaviour. That is because, as a video posted to the farm's TikTok @griebel.farms shows, lately he hasn't been acting much like a cat.

Andi Griebel, who is part of the family that runs the farm, told Newsweek that Charlie is a relative newcomer to life there. 'Charlie the orange cat joined the farm this winter, so he's a new member to the crew,' she said. 'He's very outgoing.' That outgoing nature has seen him strike up a sweet bond with one of the farm dogs, Basil. 'Basil, our English Lab, is very friendly with all of the farm cats,' Griebel said. 'It's just a matter of which cats will be friendly back to her.'

It was only recently, however, that Griebel realized just how much of an impression Basil had made on Charlie. One day on the farm, she spotted Charlie doing something entirely unexpected: wagging his tail like a dog. 'We noticed Charlie wagging his tail probably once it got nice out, and he was able to run around more with Basil,' Griebel said. Eager to share the moment, she filmed Charlie's unusual tail wagging and uploaded the clip to the Griebel Farms TikTok account. Author Of Iconic 'Rainbow Bridge' Poem Finally Revealed

The 'Rainbow Bridge' poem is iconic. Every pet lover that has loved and lost a dear pet family member has likely seen this poem - at the vet's office, from a friend, in a card or email perhaps? What you may not have noticed is that the author of the poem was always considered 'anonymous,' that is, until now thanks to a man named Paul Koudounaris.

Paul, an art historian and author from Tucson, Arizona, spent a decade researching and verifying the poem's authorship before discovering its true author, Edna Clyne-Rekhy. Edna Clyne-Rekhy, now 82 years old, is a Scottish artist and animal lover. She has finally been credited with authoring the beloved poem 'Rainbow Bridge' thanks to the detective work of Paul Koudounaris. The poem has been the source of comfort for millions of pet parents around the world.

She wrote the poem back in 1959, as a way to grieve her dog, a Labrador Retriever named Major. When she was 19, Major died in her arms and Edna was devastated by the loss. She expressed her intense grief to her mother who then prompted Edna to write her feelings down, hoping it might help with the sense of loss. She kept the poem largely to herself and shared it with a few friends. Those friends were so touched by the poem that Edna hand-typed out several copies for them but didn't name herself as the author - never imagining that there was a need. Until now, Edna had no knowledge that since 1959, her poem has travelled around the world offering comfort and hope to pet owners everywhere. Her poem even captured the attention of Abigail Van Buren of the uber-popular 'Dear Abby' column in the U.S. where 'Rainbow Bridge' was posted in a ;Dear Abby' column in 1994.

When Paul finally discovered that Edna was the author and contacted her, she was in disbelief: 'I'm absolutely stunned,' she says. 'I'm still in a state of shock.' You see, astonishingly, Edna had no idea that her poem, written more than 60 years ago had travelled the globe and comforted millions of pet owners. How is that possible, you might wonder? Edna had moved away from Scotland to an olive farm in India and had no idea.

If it weren't for the tireless effort of Paul Koudounaris, we might never know who the author was. So why has this poem become iconic among pet parents everywhere? Paul Koudounaris speculates that it has something to do with religion and that some religions did not or do not believe animals have souls and therefore, could not go to heaven. 'Rainbow Bridge' provided the assurance that pet owners needed to feel that their deep connection with their pets would live on, somehow, somewhere some way. And it still does so to this day.

A Stray Kitten Walked Up To The British Museum - Stayed For 20 Years

In 1908, a small stray kitten appeared at the gates of the British Museum in London. Day after day, he returned, sitting patiently as if waiting to be hired. One guard, Henry, finally took him in, naming him Mike - and giving him an unofficial job.

Mike became a fixture of the museum. He had a gift: he could drive away any dog without laying a paw on them. A piercing stare, a low, strange sound - and even the largest dogs would retreat.

Newspapers dubbed him 'the cat who would not allow any dog into the British Museum.' But Mike's most important duty was hunting rats that threatened the priceless artifacts inside. One staff member called him 'a cat of the rank of an ancient warrior.'

Hundreds Sign Petition To Welcome Back Cat

More than 1,000 people have signed a petition demanding that a cat banned from visiting a Costa store in Cornwall is allowed back in. Dillon has become a familiar face at Pentewan Park in St Austell and he can often be found snoozing on a chair at the cafe. However, the ginger cat was banned following a customer complaint, resulting in outrage from many regulars. They are now urging the branch to allow the cat back inside.

While people regularly mistake him as being lost, he's not actually far from home and loves to frequent the car parks looking for attention and even visits the Tesco Express store, where he sometimes gets fed. One regular, Lilith Hodgson, was so horrified by the decision that she set up a petition to demand that Costa allow Dillon back in. She said that Dillon's presence had been 'a highlight throughout [her] life' and she hoped that Costa would reconsider the decision. She wrote: 'I write this, deeply moved by the story of Dillon, the local cat that has become part of the fabric of our local community in its daily presence at Costa. Dillon's companionship has been a highlight throughout my life and undoubtedly the lives of many others. Recently, however, a fellow customer complained about Dillon's presence, resulting in Dillon being forced to stay outside. This has deeply affected our community, transforming our treasured coffee visits into melancholic reminders of Dillon's absence.' She continued: 'The petition is a call for Costa to rethink its decision, to take into account the mental health of its regulars and the happiness of Dillon who, like a loyal customer, enjoys the warmth of the indoors. We are encouraging local support in providing a voice for Dillon, and the community's desire to see him returned to his favourite lounging spot inside Costa. Please sign this petition to bring Dillon back where he belongs. We believe that an exception can be made for Dillon, and Costa can once again be a haven where residents and this remarkable cat can come together in mutual respect and admiration. Let's stand together - for Dillon, for our community, for companionship at Costa. Please sign this petition.'

Despite the petition, Costa Coffee confirmed that the feline will not be allowed back indoors. In a statement, the coffee giant said: 'Dillon the cat has been a well-loved visitor to our franchise owned and operated store in Pentewan Park. However, in line with our policy, only assistance animals and well-behaved dogs (in our dog-friendly stores) are permitted in our stores. We appreciate the community's understanding as we uphold a consistent experience for all customers.'

Cat Demands To Be Taken Out In Stroller As It Rains -You Know How This Ends



Incredible Life Of Narrowboat Cat After Being Rescued From Roadside Bin Bag

A cat who was abandoned with his mum and littermates in a bin bag and dumped on the road-side can now be found cruising the Cheshire canals. Hugo, a black and white male cat, was rescued by the RSPCA 15 years ago when he was found tied-up in a bin bag on the roadside in Surrey.

He was taken in by the RSPCA Millbrook Animal Centre in Chobham who cared for him and then rehomed him to his now owner Andy Hamblin. Since then, Hugo's life has taken a dramatic turn for the better, thanks to Andy. And he is now due to become a TV celebrity when he features on Channel 4's Narrow Escapes - a programme about life living on a narrowboat.

Andy said: 'When I saw Hugo's story, it was so sad that I knew I had to adopt him. I visited Millbrook and fell in love with Hugo. He was just a kitten when I adopted him and ever since that day he has been by my side. I work as an artist and I work from home so we have been together every day, he's my little buddy. He's such a soft, loving cat and he wants fuss all the time. He's very affectionate!'

Around three years ago, Andy and Hugo moved onto a narrowboat where Hugo has his own porthole cat flap and a special cat ladder to get on and off of the boat. Hugo has become a local celebrity with many passers-by stopping to take a picture of him coming out of his cat flap or sunbathing on top of the boat. Andy added: 'A boating friend of mine who was in series one of Narrow Escapes mentioned to the producers 'have you heard about the cat flap boat?' which then sparked their interest. They came to interview me and then said they would like to feature me in series two of the programme. I think he's going to be an absolute star - from a rescued kitten to a TV celebrity! I'd like to raise funds for the RSPCA to give something back to the charity that cared for him as a kitten. Over the last few years so many people have taken photos of the cat flap or Hugo chilling out on top of the boat and so I'm going to have a collection tin so people can donate to the RSPCA when they take a photo.'

Andy is a continuous cruiser but he mostly spends time in the Nantwich area as well as Ellesmere in Shropshire. Most of the filming for Narrow Escapes followed them on a 130 mile journey from the Ashby canal to Llangollen canal in Shropshire. Life on a narrowboat may sound different for a cat but Andy made sure to introduce this to Hugo slowly and steadily and now he says his pet loves the canal lifestyle. He said: 'He adapted to the boat really well. When he first came on the boat I would start by just running the engine for a bit and not moving anywhere for a few days so he could get used to the sound. After two or three days, he didn't even bat an eyelid. Ever since, he's fine whenever I move the boat, he just lays down on his bed and has a sleep. He has his own little ladder at the back just in case he comes off so he can get himself back up but he has never needed it. He also has a porthole cat flap which switches sides and I can close it when we're moving. This means he can come and go as he pleases but we've got such a close bond that he won't go far and within an hour he's back at the boat. I'm a continuous cruiser on canals so he's used to the moving and knows when it's time to set off again. I call him and he comes running back in and off we go. Then when we stop again he gets out and has a little explore - he loves it! You couldn't want a more chilled, loving cat. He's a really good companion and I'm grateful to have him.'

Narrow Escapes Producer, Sarah Adams, added: 'From the moment I met Andy and Hugo I knew that our viewers would absolutely take them to their hearts. They are completely devoted to each other and Hugo has adapted brilliantly to boat life. His back story is so sad but thanks to the amazing work of the RSPCA and Andy's love and care Hugo really is living his best life aboard a boat that has special modifications to make sure he lives in the lap of luxury! As well as the most famous cat flap on our canals, Hugo has a special hammock for essential cat napping and a step to help him jump onto the bed where he enjoys lots of cuddles with Andy.'

Cat Survives 400-Foot Fall That Killed Owners

A feline fall survivor is recovering at a Utah animal sanctuary after tourists spotted her following a nearly 400-foot fall that claimed the lives of her owners. The couple and their cat, named Mirage, went over the viewpoint in Bryce Canyon on April 29, according to press releases. Wade Mathews, spokesperson for the Garfield County Sheriff's Office told Newsweek by phone Monday that other tourists spotted the bodies of the couple, who climbed a railing before the fall. The pair was identified as Matthew Nannen, 45, and Bailee Crane, 58, in a press release.



As for the 12-year-old tabby, she is now being treated for two broken ribs while shelter employees determine if the extended family of the couple plans to take her in. 'She's very, very sweet,' Judah Battista, Best Friends chief Sanctuary officer told Newsweek over the phone Monday, adding, 'She's recovering well and enjoys the attention of the care staff.'

The viewpoint where the couple fell receives thousands of visitors a day, according to a spokesperson for Bryce Canyon National Park. A rail surrounds the viewpoint, and no other deaths have been reported, the spokesperson told Newsweek. The park features columns of rock, also known as hoodoos, and sits about 130 miles northwest of St. George, Utah, the website shows.

It appears the couple climbed over a railing before their fall, Mathews told Newsweek. 'There was snow on the ground which would have made the clay slippery. They had gone over the railing; they had climbed over the railing intentionally. Whether it was slippery or intentional we don't know.'

Crane and Nannen were living in a U-Haul truck, and their last known residency was listed in Florida, a press release from the sheriff's office said. They had previously travelled to Arizona and were staying in Utah. The recovery of the pair was completed by the Garfield County Sheriff's Search and Rescue team, Bryce Canyon Park Rangers and the Department of Public Safety Aero Bureau, the press release said, adding that the pilot of the DPS helicopter 'was especially helpful in ensuring the safety of the rest of the responders.'

The cat was found in a soft carrier and quickly taken to the Best Friends Animal Sanctuary nearby where she received a full medical workup that included bloodwork, X-rays and an exam by a veterinarian, Battista told Newsweek. Battista said Mirage is 'getting a lot of attention but not allowed to do a lot of exercise. She's in very good spirits. She's not been very picky. She likes it quiet, and she likes attention, but I think she's found the whole experience overwhelming for obvious reasons,' he explained.

Mathews said the cause of the deaths was the fall, but the manner has not yet been determined. There was no note left. The viewpoint remains open.

The extended family of Mirage's owners has been in contact with the Sanctuary, but it is unclear where she will go when she has fully recovered. Battiste says right now, Mirage is on restricted activity for at least the next 6 weeks while she recovers from two broken ribs and broken teeth.

Cat Wanders Into Third-Grade Class -And Decides He's Never Leaving

One day, in 2018, Tombi appeared on the grounds of a public elementary school in the city of Izmir, Turkey. Unlike most stray cats, who can be quite skittish, Tombi was friendly and outgoing - walking up to kids outside seeking attention and pets. But Tombi didn't stop there. After a couple of weeks of hanging out exclusively in the school's garden, Tombi apparently decided to try his paws at a formal education. For a street-smart cat, the third grade seemed like a good place to start. 'He came into our classroom,' teacher Özlem Pınar Ivaşcu told The



Dodo. 'The children liked him very much.' And just like that, Tombi became part of Mrs. Ivaşcu's class.

Having a cat prowling around the classroom might seem like it would be wholly a distraction for young students, potentially hindering their learning - but Ivaşcu found that Tombi was having the opposite effect. Seeing the cat's playful curiosity had caused her kids to become more excited to be in class. Ivaşcu's students used to run and horse around in the classroom between lessons. But with a cat around to engage them, they became better able to stay focused. Even the morning bell had a more pleasant ring to it - all thanks to Tombi. 'The children come on time to school, and they are taking care of Tombi,' Ivaşcu said. 'This is good for them.'



It was also good for Tombi. Not only did the cat have a safe place to sleep and spend his days, with bowls full of food and water to call his own, he had dozens of new friends looking out for his best interests. Ivaşcu took Tombi to the vet to make sure he's healthy and gotten him vaccinated.

Things in Ivaşcu's class had never been better - but then a problem threatened to bring it to an end. After learning that a stray cat had free run of the class, one student's parents lodged a complaint with school officials, saying that it could pose a health risk. Administrators then told İvaşcu that that Tombi had to go. The class was devastated - and the cat was too. 'We found a home for Tombi and he stayed three days there, but he was not happy. He

stopped eating,' İvaşcu said. 'So I took him in at my house, but also here he was not very happy. 'Tombi's friends at the school even wrote letters to try and cheer him up.

Seeing that the cat wasn't getting better, İvaşcu decided to write about his sad situation on social media. From there, word about Tombi spread like wildfire. 'The story got a lot of attention and support on all TV news,' İvaşcu said. 'I had a lot of support from many people, including from my manager and the director of education in İzmir. 'Even the parent who complained had a change of heart. She wanted the cat back in class, too.

And sure enough, school officials gave the OK for Tombi to return. 'The children were very happy to have Tombi back,' İvaşcu said. 'And he is happy again to be with the kids.' Tombi meant the world to the 33 students in İvaşcu's third grade class that year - but he went on to reach more than them alone. That year, inspired by the cat's positive influence on her group of little learners, İvaşcu wrote and published a book about Tombi.

Years have passed since Tombi first strutted into İvaşcu's classroom - but his story hardly ended there. Since then, İvaşcu has reportedly moved abroad, bidding farewell to the school and her former students, though she didn't leave it all behind her. Joining her on that journey was the storybook cat, Tombi, eager to write their next chapter of life.

Health - Cats With Arthritis Are Wearing Caps In Groundbreaking Research To Understand & Relieve Their Pain

Cats are wearing hats for science - as researchers use brain scans to understand pain in arthritic felines, and find a way to soothe it. It's a world first for veterinary scientists at the University of Montreal (UdeM): they found a way to scan the brains of cats while they're still awake, using electrodes concealed under specially-knitted wool caps.

Chronic pain associated with osteoarthritis affects over 25 % of the adult feline population and this incidence increases with age. Seeking to understand how cats experience the chronic pain, the researchers wanted to create a non-invasive method to study their brains.



In previous studies, the cat subjects would shake off and chew the wires of traditional electrodes. The answer was to incorporate the sensors into comfy crocheted beanies. 'We had the idea of the little knitted hat that would keep the electrodes in place,' said Aude Castel, Assistant Professor at UdeM Faculty of Veterinary Medicine in the Department of Clinical Sciences.

The team wanted to use sensory stimulation to try to reduce the aches, exposing the cats to soothing stimuli such as coloured lights and comforting smells, as a way to ease their suffering. 'With some treats and positive reinforcement, the cats tolerated the hat very well and allowed us to record their brain activity while awake and being exposed to different types of sensory stimuli: citrus smell, different light colours.' In all, they studied 11 adult cats with osteoarthritis, assessing their stress and pain using the electrodes that produced electroencephalograms (EEGs). 'The reasoning behind exposing them to different stimulations is that we wanted to see if, just like in people, we could modulate their brain activity and, by the same token their pain perception, with sensory stimulation.'

The study, published in the Journal of Neuroscience Methods, found that the hat method is feasible, and spectral analysis are efficient methods to characterize the response to a given sensory stimulation. 'This opens new avenues for investigating chronic pain mechanisms and developing novel therapeutic strategies,' the report concluded. 'We now plan to obtain NSERC funding (Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada), in partnership with private companies, to enable us to establish a genuine EEG signature for chronic pain, and many other applications that will enable us to automate chronic pain detection in the future,' said Éric Troncy, who co-led the study.

'Unadoptable' Shelter Cat Had Given Up On Life -Then A Stranger Saw Him

When one New Jersey woman first saw a shut-down shelter cat marked as 'unadoptable,' she knew exactly what she had to do. 'The first time I saw him, all the other cats were roaming around the shelter, but Crusty was alone in a cage. Sad, defeated, and with these haunting black eyes,' Alanna, 30, told Newsweek. 'He looked like he'd completely given up. I knew I couldn't leave him there.'

Crusty the cat is now around 9 years old, and is almost unrecognizable from when he was adopted in 2023. 'Initially, the shelter marked him as 'unadoptable' due to his health and age,'

Alanna explained. 'But I showed up almost every day to advocate for him until they agreed to let me take him home.'

Crusty has chronic FHV or Feline Herpesvirus, the highly contagious condition which causes sneezing, nasal discharge, inflammation of the eyes and loss of appetite. This paired with his time in the shelter had left the cat dejected. 'He wasn't even grooming himself anymore. He'd stopped engaging with the world around him, just lying still, completely shut down. It was heartbreaking,' Alanna said. The shelter walked Alanna through how to give Crusty his medications, and she brought him home. It is here that his life really changed.

'From night one. He curled up and slept right on my chest, and that's been his spot ever since,' she said. 'He's a total Velcro cat - happiest when he's in my lap or taking long baths, which is extra special considering he wasn't even bathing when I met him.'

Today, the ginger and white cat is almost unrecognizable from the shut-down feline in the shelter. 'There's this deep bond that formed the moment he let his guard down - like he knew he was safe,' Alanna said.

A mom has discovered that, while her toddler isn't yet speaking in full sentences, she's already fluent in 'cat.'

Ina, a mom of two based in Michigan, told Newsweek she has always loved filming the everyday 'sweet and funny moments' involving her kids. Ever since she started to post these videos to TikTok under the handle@girlmom_travelsandfun, Ina has discovered she's not alone in enjoying these moments either.



One of her most recent videos, showcasing her toddler daughter's sweet interaction with their cat Mici has proven especially popular. It captures the young girl, who Ina has chosen not to name for this story, enjoying a full-blown conversation with her cat friend. The toddler isn't speaking English though, but instead communicating with a series of 'meows.' Ina's daughter appears to be offering Mici a blanket in the video, which has amassed more than 868,000 views since being posted at the end of last month. The two then exchange words, or meows, before Mici decides to head elsewhere. A caption on screen reads: 'My child speaks cat before any other languages.'

Ina, who only shared her first name, said she primarily shared the clip because the interaction looked cute. 'My baby and our cat looked so adorable, it felt like they were having a real conversation,' she said. There is more to these interactions than just cute cat content. According to Ina, her daughter has developed a noticeable appreciation for the cat language. 'Around 10 months old, I noticed my daughter starting to meow at the cat, it started off softly but got louder as she gained confidence in her 'cat language,' Ina said. Things have developed since then to sweet interactions much like the ones seen in this video. 'Now, they have daily 'chats,' and what's even more adorable is that Mici, who's a very vocal cat, actually meows back!' Ina said.

Though developing her daughter's ability to 'speak cat' may not be high on Ina's list of priorities as a parent, having Mici around is likely to be of significant benefit.

In 2006, a study published in the journal Anthrozoos found that developing a close bond with a pet from a young age was associated with higher levels of empathy in young children. Mici has been a consistent presence in Ina's daughter's life. 'My daughter just turned one at the end of March,' Ina said. 'She's grown up around our cat, Mici, who is 10 years old and came with us from overseas along with three other pets.'

Ina knows there will come a day when her daughter will 'outgrow' habits like talking cat, so is focused on sharing content highlighting 'the special bond' they have and, hopefully, in the process, making a few people smile.
