will end on a highlight in October with The Supreme.


SABCCI and the GCCFI will hold a '2 in 1' Championship show, now on the 16th of April,


2 shows running in the same hall at the same time.

## Firefighters Save Kitten Stuck In An ATM – And His New Name Is Cash

Cats are known for getting themselves stuck in all manner of places, but for the staff at Fort Smith Animal Haven, an ATM was a first. A grey tabby had to be withdrawn from an ATM by Fort Smith Fire Department in Arkansas, after someone probably heard a meow inside the machine.

After arriving at the shelter, 'Cash' surprised everyone with his story. 'Probably trying to find shade is why, but I can't tell you how,' Alexis Bloom, a cat and kennel tech at Fort Smith Animal Haven, told local news. 'This is actually my first experience with a cat getting stuck in an ATM,' added vet tech Ashley Deane. 'You know, I never thought that somebody would be able to go up and make a withdrawal and get a cat out instead of some cash, so now we have both.'

The tabby was hungry, cranky, in need of a bath, and a name. Cash was a pretty obvious choice for the little would be catburglar. After a week or so, the kitten has made a full recovery, and is getting up to a healthy weight before he can receive his vaccinations and socialize with other kittens on his way to a foster home. No doubt Cash will be a popular withdrawal after his story made headlines, but the shelter said there are plenty of loving animals in need of a home.

Recently GNN reported on a kitten (another grey tabby) stuck in a Pepsi Co. vending machine outside of a Walmart, proving that there is virtually no machinery too enclosed for a kitten to infiltrate.

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#### **SABCCI - Celebrating 70 Years**

The Siamese Cat Club, which was founded in Dublin in 1953, was the first cat club in Ireland. At that time, an Irish lady, by name Kathleen Williams, was a famous breeder and judge of Siamese in Great Britain. Her very well known Prefix 'Doneraile' will be found in the early Siamese pedigrees. This lady gave great encouragement to those founding the Irish club and to this day there is a Doneraile Trophy awarded each year. Mrs. Billie Macdougald and Mrs. Jill Coyne were also very enthusiastic founder members.

The first show was held in the Mansion House, and Mrs. Kathleen Williams came to judge the exhibits. Subsequent shows were held in the Engineers Hall and the Molesworth Hall. The club maintained a register for Siamese cats and in those early days only Siamese were registered. In 1968 the Governing Council for the Cat Fancy of Ireland came into being and performed the same function for cats as the Kennel Club does for dogs. The new body took over registrations and gradually breeds other than Siamese began to make an appearance and had to be registered.


To enable shows to cater for the emerging breeds the club name was changed to Siamese & All Breeds Cat Club of Ireland. Clubs were affiliated to the GCCFI and that body granted licences for shows under strict guide lines. For the first time it was possible for cats to compete for challenge certificates at championship shows and, having won three under three different judges, to be titled 'Champion' or, in the case of neutered cats, 'Premier'.

In the late 60's the annual show moved from the Molesworth Hall to the Supper Room in the Mansion House and the entries increased year by year. Judges from Great Britain were invited to the shows which added to the interest for exhibitors. During the mid 70's and into the 80's the shows were held in the Royal Dublin Society and these were good years, with entries reaching almost 200 in number. In the early 90's the show returned to the Mansion House and occupied both the Round Room for the pedigree exhibits and the Supper Room for a large non-pedigree section. The Mansion House continued to be the venue until it closed for renovation. In the following years the show moved to various local venues around Dublin including Knocklyon, Templeogue, Ballinteer and Dun Laoire.


Unfortunately, in recent years interest in showing cats has decreased and entries are now to an all time low. This is despite the hard work of dedicated members who strive to keep interest alive. As well as the annual show, the Club produces a Newsletter for members two or three times a year and endeavours to hold some social and educational functions. Edited from SABCCI website







We were grateful to have Amber as a connection and reminder of Bett for the next 12 years. Amber came home to live with my Mom, myself and Gabby, my Thai cat (Applehead Siamese) kitten, who was 4 months old at the time. The two of them, Amber and Gabby, became partners in crime, they never fought but were more like best friends than bonded siblings. In photos Amber gives the impression of being a stern, serious, ladylike cat but in real life she was a funny mischievous little 'Fluffernutter' (a marshmallow fluff and peanut butter sandwich in North America, we're originally from Canada). At night Amber

chose to sleep in the bed beside my Mom and each night as soon as the lights went out, Amber would bring her favourite toy up to the bedroom, singing the song of her people at the top of her lungs. Amber loved vigorous pats (we called them big puppy pats), having her fluff ruffled and to have her tail gently tugged as she walked by but she absolutely hated to be brushed!

Amber crossed the Rainbow Bridge unexpectedly, but peacefully, in my arms while we told her how much we loved her, in UCD Emergency Hospital in the early morning hours of December 27 2022. We are still heartbroken but take comfort in knowing that Bett and Amber are together once again.

A cat performed the most head-scratching stunt in Wales recently on class picture day, leaving a group of proud moms 'in floods of laughter.'



'Chloe handed the letter to me and I expected it to be her photos,' Chloe's mom Emma Roberts told local Welsh news, The Leader. #### How the Army Corps of Engineers Made Us Love Their 2023 Calendar: They Added Giant Cats! (And it's Free)


Engineering might be boring to over half the country, but this government agency got creative in imagining the purr-fect way to engage everyone.

The new 2023 calendar highlighting the achievements of the US Army Corps of Engineers features giant cats superimposed in photos of their engineering successes. The result is a collection of hilarious scenes. The pages showcase cats lying on dams, stretching on steel beams, and dominating huge construction vehicles. Further feline fun shows cats using cranes as dangle toys.

The District engineers operate locks and dams along the Columbia River, and provides flood risk management using dams in the Willamette Valley. It maintains Oregon's coastal rivers for navigation and leads the Nation in hydropower generation.

Because the Corps is a federal government agency, their calendar is in the public domain - and you can download their PDF file and print it yourself for free. The Portland District of the Corps needed an eye-catching way of showing off their civil works programs across Oregon and southwestern Washington.

#### 'Conjoined' Cats Take Home Top Prize At Comedy Pet Photo Awards

A photograph of two seemingly conjoined cats has been awarded first prize at this year's Comedy Pet Photo Awards. The winning picture was captured by Japanese photographer Kenichi Morinaga.

Morinaga spends his time travelling around Japan's islands to photograph street cats. The photograph of the 'conjoined' pets shows two cats, one with a snowy white coat and one with marmalade fur, sitting side-by-side on a fence. The cats are pressing their necks together to give the appearance of being conjoined.



Awarded Comedy Pet Photographer of the year, Morinaga has won a cash prize of £2,000, plus a £5,000 donation to an animal charity of his choice. The winner said his passion for cat photography began after he became a cat owner himself and visited Europe as a backpacker. 'Suddenly, I became fascinated by the antics of cats out in the streets and had to photograph them,' Morinaga said. 'When I returned to Japan, I continued to seek them out, they really cheer me up, especially after the last two years of the pandemic.'



#### Larry Is Back Again! Cat v Fox: What Made Downing Street's Larry So Brave?



Larry, the 10 Downing Street cat, stepped up from mouser duties this week to chase an urban fox off his patch. The burly tabby was caught on camera intently stalking the fox before launching into a fully fledged pursuit when the trespasser tried to take cover in a flowerbed.

Larry emerges the victor, but the encounter has led some to wonder what gives cats the brazen confidence to take on larger animals such as foxes or dogs. Experts say cat behaviour is strongly shaped by instincts that date back to their wild ancestors. Domestic cats are far more similar, genetically and in behaviour, to wild relatives than

dogs are to wolves. As solitary hunters, establishing and maintaining control of territory in which to hunt and mate is central to the cat lifestyle. 'Cats will confront most other animals if threatened, even dogs,' said Nicky Trevorrow, a behaviour manager at the charity Cats Protection. 'This is because they're naturally territorial, it's an ingrained instinct, so will often challenge any other animals on their territory.'

Cats typically have favoured areas to sleep and eat and mark out their 'home range' by spraying, rubbing their facial scent markers on objects and scratching around the area to warn off other cats. Cats patrol their territory along a network of paths, often on a regular schedule, allowing neighbouring cats to avoid encounters that could result in a standoff. A cat's sex (unneutered males tend to be more confrontational), life experience and disposition play a role in how it will react to any encroachment on their territory.

'There is a lot of individual variation in how strongly they will react to perceived intruders, and whether they will take on animals, such as foxes, that are larger than themselves,' said Prof James Serpell, an animal welfare expert at the University of Pennsylvania. 'If a cat's first encounter with a fox causes that fox to run away, it will likely embolden the cat in any subsequent encounters with foxes.'

Foxes may be bigger with more powerful jaws, but evidence suggests other cats often prove more formidable adversaries. A 2013 analysis of VetCompass, a clinical database of vet visits, identified five confirmed and nine suspected fox fight injuries for each 10,000 vet visits by cats (there was no data to indicate how foxes fared in these scuffles). This compared with 541 in 10,000 for cats presented with cat bite injuries and 196 in 10,000 cats being presented after a road traffic accident. 'So to put fox attacks into context, other cats (40 times greater risk) and cars (14 times) appear to present much greater dangers to cats than foxes,' concluded Pete Wedderburn, a vet and broadcaster, who carried out the fox risk assessment. 'Cats and foxes usually pose no threat to one another and it's unusual for any harm to be caused to either of them when in close proximity,' told Trevorrow.

#### Poland's Hottest Tourist Attraction Is A Fat Black & White Cat Named Gacek

The 'King of Kaszubska Street' has beaten a 12th-century castle in the tourist popularity stakes A fat black and white cat has become a major tourist attraction in the Polish city of Szczecin.

Gacek, a free-roaming feline who lives in a box on Kaszubska Street in Poland's seventh largest city, has captured the attention of cat enthusiasts around the world. The rotund animal had a five-star rating on Google Maps, clocking up more than 2,500 reviews, according to local reports, before it was removed. A new listing for Gacek attracted almost 500 reviews and an average five-star rating in its first 48 hours, according to Insider, beating other attractions in the sea port city, including the 12th-century Pomeranian Dukes' Castle.



The cat, whose name means 'long-eared bat' in Polish and is pronounced 'gats-ek', has been a resident of the city for many years, earning the affections of locals and visitors alike, but his international reputation exploded after a 2020 video by local news outlet wSzczecinie went viral. Now, ailurophiles from around the world are being drawn to the city in a bid to meet the 'King of Kaszubska Street' in the fur.

'I flew from Oslo with transit in Gdańsk to see Gacek,' wrote one five-star review from August 2021. 'As expected, he didn't pay any attention to me which made the experience fully wholesome. If I could have dinner with anyone in the world, I would fly again in an instant to feed him,' it continued. 'It was worth travelling three hours to feel ignored by him,' wrote another. A third reviewer commented: 'I am very fortunate to meet this distinguished gentle creature.'

Visitors offering Gacek snacks led to concern about his increasingly plump appearance, prompting a local animal shelter to ask people not to feed the famous cat. A sign beside his box house asks admirers to only leave treats in closed packets which his owner can open for him. 'I happily pose for pictures, but please don't stroke me while I'm having a nap,' the sign adds.

'Cat tourism' is a concept not confined to Szczecin, however. Lovers of our furry friends are also drawn to the Ernest Hemingway Home and Museum in Key West, Florida. As well as being the former abode of the great American novelist, it's also home to around 50 free-roaming cats, all of whom are descended from Hemingway's original Maine coon, Snowball. www.independent.co.uk, J. #### Cats Who Live Together Know Each Other By Name, **Japanese Study Finds**

Cats who live with other feline companions can identify and learn each other's names, a new study in Japan has shown. The discovery by scientists at Kyoto University was made after studying 48 cats that cohabitated with at least two other pets – either in a home or at a cat cafe.

The study did so by decoding the cognitive abilities of the cats; all cats in the study were shown a picture of one of the other cats they lived with and over the course of the study, the responses from the cats were monitored whenever a name of the cat or a completely unrelated name was called.

The felines were tested individually in a familiar room, the study said. According to the scientists, if the cat stared at a photo long enough, it was a definite sign that the cat knew the pictured animal's real name. In the case of domestic felines, the cats spent a longer period of time staring at the photo when the name of the cat did not match the pictured animal, which researchers said indicated an 'expectancy violation effect'. One cat, according to the study, 'completed only the first trial before escaping from the room and climbing out of reach'.

The study concluded that the number of household members also affected the cats' responses: 'with more family members, cats attended for longer to the monitor in the incongruent condition,' it said. It also found that cats that had lived with their family for longer showed the most amount of attention when the name-face relationship was incompatible.

The results from the study suggest that cats may be able to learn names from observing human interactions. In the case of domestic cats, the feline matched 'at least their companion cats' names and faces, and possibly their human family members' names'.

This is the first such evidence showing that domestic cats can connect human utterances and their names through their lived everyday experiences. However, scientists are still unclear on what motives the cats have behind remembering names. 'One possible explanation has to do with competition. For example, a cat might receive food when the owner calls her name but not when she calls another cat's name,' the study said. www.independent.co.uk, May 2022

#### Health - Why Cat Hiccups Happen - And What To Do About Them

Have you ever caught your cat hiccupping? You're not alone. Here's what causes cat hiccups, when to worry about them and when to just laugh.

The Science Behind Cat Hiccups

From a veterinarian point of view, a cat hiccups when her diaphragm decides to contract at exactly the same time as the part of her larynx that houses the vocal chords closes. Sometimes this happens due to nerve irritation issues, and other times it's a consequence of chowing down too quickly on food and ingesting air at the same time. (Fun factoid: In humans, this can also cause acid reflux.)

Hang On, What About Hairballs? - Oh, I should add that the scourge of the feline that is a hairball can also actually cause a cat to hiccup. This takes place when the cat's throat tries in vain to expel or move the fur that's accumulated, but instead irritates things and prompts a hiccup.

How Concerned Should I Be About Cat Hiccupping? - If your cat suffers from sporadic, small bouts of hiccups, you've probably got nothing to be overly concerned about. In fact, she's probably just feasting on her food too quickly. But if your cat seems to be hiccuping for longer than a day at a time, it's probably time to consult a vet as there could be larger ailments and issues at play. Feline asthma is one such concern, as is heart disease or icky parasites. Oh, and there could even be a food allergy at work. Yes, with cats it's so often always about the food.

What Can I Do About Cat Hiccups? - First up, don't stress your cat out if she's hiccuping. Keep things calm and give her some space.

Next, do a quick survey of your cat's food. Does she scarf it down way too quickly? If so, try serving smaller portions throughout the day. Also, ensure that she always has access to water - and is actually drinking it. If you're cohabiting with one of those kitties who refuse to drink settled water out of her bowl, look into picking up a cheap water fountain, sometimes our finicky friends prefer cascading water. Because, you know, it obviously tastes *so* different.

Also, if hairballs do seem to be tied to any hiccupping action, ask a vet for recommendations to control the condition. Finally, let the record show that the age-old remedies to cure human hiccupping should probably not be used on cats. That includes scaring your feline witless, attempting to get her to hold her breath (good luck with that one) and the bartender's trick of biting into a lemon doused in Angostura bitters. #### Some Scientific Benefits Of Being A Cat Owner

#### Owning a cat is better for the environment

If you're worried about your carbon footprint, it's better to own a cat than a dog. A 2009 study found that the resources needed to feed a dog over the course of its life create the same eco-footprint as that of a Land Cruiser. Meanwhile, cats - which eat less in general and are more likely to eat fish than corn or beef flavoured products - only have the approximate carbon footprint of a small hatchback.

#### ... And find a significant other

If you're a single guy and you can't seem to get a date, get a cat! A British poll found that 82 percent of women agreed they are more attracted to men who like animals. And while having a dog will do wonders for your dating life, a whopping 90 percent of single women said that men who own a cat are 'nicer' than other guys. Listing that you own a cat on your dating profile could do wonders for the number of responses you get - but remember, a cat is for life, not just until you find a partner.

#### Cat ownership means fewer allergies

Sadly, it's too late for you, but if you have a child on the way, it might be time to get a cat. In 2002, the National Institutes of Health released a study that found children under a year old who were exposed to a cat were less likely to develop allergies and not just pet allergies. According to Marshall Plaut, M.D., chief of the allergic mechanisms section at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, 'high pet exposure early in life appears to protect against not only pet allergy but also other types of common allergies, such as allergy to dust mites, ragweed, and grass.' And while the cat parasite Toxoplasma gondii is a threat to young children, experts say that by changing your cat's litter box every day and keeping the animal indoors, you should be safe and allergy free!

#### You'll have a healthier heart

Owning any pet is good for your heart. Cats in particular lower your stress level - possibly since they don't require as much effort as dogs - and lower the amount of anxiety in your life. Petting a cat has a positive calming effect. One study found that over a 10-year period cat owners were 30 percent less likely to die of a heart attack or stroke than non-cat owners (although this might just be because cat owners are more relaxed and have lower stress in general).

#### They fulfil your need for companionship

The stereotype that dogs are more affectionate than cats is just that: a stereotype. In fact, it turns out that cats can be just as good of companions as dogs, especially for women. An Austrian study conducted in 2003 found that having a cat in the house is the emotional equivalent of having a romantic partner. As well as initiating contact much of the time, studies have shown cats will remember kindness shown to them and return the favour later. But cats really do have the upper hand in these relationships. After thousands of years of domestication, cats have learned how to make a half purr/half howl noise that sounds remarkably like a human baby's cry. And since our brains are programmed to respond to our children's distress, it is almost impossible to ignore what a cat wants when it demands it like that.

#### **Charity Seeks Home For Kitten That Is Neither Male Nor Female**

A homeless kitten has stunned vets at a UK animal charity, being the first cat they have seen that is neither male nor female. Hope, a 15-week-old tabby and white cat, was originally thought to be female when it was admitted to the Cats Protection rescue centre in Warrington, but vets found no external sex organs.



Cats Protection's senior field veterinary officer, Fiona Brockbank, said it appeared to be a case of agenesis, the failure of an organ to develop, which she and her colleagues had never seen before. Vets said they had seen hermaphrodite cats, with male and female sex organs, though they were rare. However, after an investigation, they found Hope had no sex organs, externally or internally. Brockbank said: 'There's an outside possibility of some ectopic ovarian tissue hiding away internally but we think this is extremely unlikely ... This is so rare that there isn't really a commonly used term for this condition, but it is effectively sexual organ agenesis. While this means we don't have any previous cases, on which, to base our knowledge of how this will affect Hope in the future, we spent time monitoring this cat to ensure they can urinate and defecate appropriately before they were considered ready for rehoming'.

Hope, who is described as a playful kitten, has endeared itself to staff and volunteers at Cats Protection's Warrington adoption centre, where it was first admitted and underwent investigations, and the Tyneside adoption centre in Gateshead. The Tyneside centre manager, Beni Benstead, said: 'Discovering Hope's special status has been an exciting time, as none of us has seen this before or is likely to again'. www.theguardian.com, Jane Clinton, November 2022
